

The Cook-Rees Memorial Fund for Water Search and Safety

FACTSHEET

The Cook-Rees Memorial Fund for Water Search and Safety (CRMF) was founded in 1998 by Canadian singer/composer Loreena McKennitt after a tragic boating incident claimed the lives of her partner, his brother, and a friend. Determined to help prevent similar tragedies, McKennitt established a fund to promote education, research, training, and equipment purchases to benefit water safety initiatives. Today, the Cook-Rees Memorial Fund has succeeded in raising over \$3 million for water search and safety.

- July 1998 Ronald Rees, Richard Rees, and Gregory Cook embark on a sunset sail on Georgian Bay but do not return; an exhaustive search by the Canadian Coast Guard turns up only one of the men's bodies.
- September 1998 Ronald Rees's partner, Canadian singer/composer Loreena McKennitt, founds the Cook-Rees Memorial Fund for Water Search and Safety. Loreena pledges proceeds from sales of her forthcoming double album, Live In Paris And Toronto, to the fund.
- 1998 The Cook-Rees Fund presents a side scan sonar and underwater remote operated vehicle to the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP). Two additional sonar units are donated in 2002.
- 2000 An Advisory Committee of Canadian water safety experts is set up to oversee the fund.
- 2001 Sales of Live In Paris And Toronto top 300,000 raising \$3 million for the fund.
- 2002 The Cook-Rees Fund sponsors "Will it Float?" a groundbreaking research report about the mandatory use of personal flotation devices, prepared for the Canadian Safe Boating Council by SMARTRISK.
- 2003 The OPP presents Loreena McKennitt with an award recognizing The Cook-Rees Fund's significant contributions of search and rescue equipment.
- 2004 The Cook-Rees Memorial Fund receives official charitable status.
